Lesson 2: Know and Do

Big Idea

Pets need responsible owners and caregivers who provide them with the things they need to be healthy and happy. Caring for pets is an important job that takes time, commitment and responsibility.

Learning Goal/Learner Competency

Students will identify the responsibilities of pet owners and caregivers.

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Organization

Approximate Total Lesson Time: 30 - 40 minutes.



Note: The times listed are intended to be used as a guideline. Teachers may make adjustments to time as needed to suit the needs and size of their class

Required Background Knowledge

Students will need to know what a responsibility is to understand the responsibilities pet owners have for animal care. If required, review what the word responsibility means. If a word wall was started in lesson one, add the word "responsibility" to the word wall. See the appendix for word wall cards.

Engagement & Making Connections

Introduce the lesson by inviting students to think about the things they need to bring to school each day.



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Invite a volunteer to open and unpack their backpack for the class, or, create a sample backpack that includes items such as a lunch box, water bottle, permission form, gym shoes, planner or agenda, ball, etc.

As each item is removed from the backpack, activate students' thinking with prompts such as:

- What if you opened your back pack and this item wasn't there?
- How might you feel or react?

Briefly summarize students' observations and thinking, writing some highlights on the chart paper or the board.

Ask students, "Who takes responsibility for making sure that you have what you need in your backpack?"

Invite students to think about how they depend on their parents to meet their needs. Also note that as they grow, students take on more and more responsibility for themselves.

Challenge & Collaboration

Introduce this challenge with a reminder that we are not the only ones who depend on others to get what we need. Pets depend on their owners and caregivers to meet their needs too. Think of all the things that pets need and can't get or do for themselves.

Organize students into partners or small groups. Remember that some students may be unfamiliar with the needs of household pets. Pair these students with peers that do have experience with pets.

Provide each pair or group with a copy of **Know and Do To-Do List**, provided at the end of this lesson. Challenge students to use words or drawings to create a 'To Do' List of the things pet owners and caregivers need to do to be sure that their pet is well cared for.

After groups have listed a number of items of things 'To Do', invite them to walk around the room and gather ideas from other groups to add to their lists.

Challenge students to review their lists and identify responsibilities that should be done every day as well as those that may need to be carried out less frequently (every day, regularly, sometimes).

Consolidation

Assist students in consolidating their thinking by posing prompts such as:

- To be healthy and happy, we need ...
- We depend on our parents and teachers for ... because ...

Using the photos provided at the end of this lesson (Pets Depend on Us For...), prompt students to answer the following:

Pets depend on us for ... because ...



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Reflection & Response

Ticket out the Door (written or verbal) see the template at the end of this lesson. Engage students in reflecting on their learning experience using a prompt such as:

One of the most important things that we need to do for our pets is ... because ...

Optional Extensions

Have students use the same 'To Do' template to create a list of needs for a specific pet they have or would like to have.

Have students create a poster about what pets need using the information they have gathered for their 'To Do' lists. If desired, further challenge students by assigning a specific pet (e.g. a cat) to the entire class or allowing students to select their own specific pet for their poster.
