Since 1873, the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society has been working together with communities to make a difference in the lives of animals. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, communities looked to us to continue taking the lead to care for animals.

Deemed an essential service by the Government of Ontario, the Ontario SPCA was able to remain open by appointment to be there for animals when they needed us most. After careful consideration and research to determine the best way to keep communities safe, limited contact adoptions were introduced at Ontario SPCA animal centres across the province.

Through this new approach, we were able to stay true to our adoption principles to help ensure the matches we make are for life. Thanks to the dedication of our compassionate front-line animal care team and dedicated foster families willing to give the most vulnerable animals a quiet place to

thrive, over 3,400 animals found loving homes in 2020.

Among them was Rufus, a 20-year-old cat who needed a new home when his "mom" had to move into a retirement home that sadly didn't allow animals. We promised we would help find her beloved cat a new home. Through the limited contact adoption process, Rufus now has a new family to love him forever.

Through the Urgent Animal Care Fund, we did everything possible to keep

animals with the families who love them. Averaging close to 800 calls per month to our 310-SPCA (7722) call centre, we received requests for everything from advice and resources to veterinary care and food for our furry friends. The Urgent Animal Care Fund was established to help ensure animals in our communities are safe should their families face challenges during the pandemic.

Food was one of the biggest needs; by the end of 2020, more than 500,000 lbs of food for animals had been distributed. This was made possible thanks to the generosity of donors and corporate partners, including Royal Canin®, Pet Valu, Rolf C. Hagen, Smucker Foods of Canada Corp., Mars Petcare, Mondou and Walmart Canada. A steady stream of food and supplies for animals, including kitty litter, rolled into donated warehouses in Midland, Picton, Dryden and Cornwall before being delivered by Ontario SPCA team members to food banks in communities across the province.

Many people will go without basic items for themselves if it means ensuring their furry family member has eaten. By being able to fill bowls across the province, those who are struggling are able to focus on other needs.

For many people, a wagging tail or contented purr has been what has helped them cope with the pandemic. Thank you to everyone – our staff, volunteers, donors, corporate partners and community leaders – for recognizing the importance of the human-animal bond and for standing beside us as partners in animal well-being during a truly unprecedented time.

United by Animals delivers urgent resources to the North

In remote Northern communities. many barriers exist that do not exist in the South, including a lack of basic animal wellness services, such as veterinarians and spay/neuter services. Getting supplies, resources and supplies to these communities can be a logistical challenge at the best of times. In a pandemic it takes a determined team - a team that is United by Animals.

United by Animals is a network of SPCAs and humane societies who come together regularly to foster meaningful discussion and collaborative opportunities to improve animal well-being across Ontario, Canada and beyond.

In a race against winter weather, which makes it very challenging

to get animal resources to many Northern communities, United by Animals took urgent action in the fall of 2020. Working with Northern communities, these partners supplied much-needed resources, such as food, supplies, spay/neuter and animal wellness services and animal rehoming and transport.

By the end of October, the SPCAs and humane societies that make up the United by Animals network had travelled over 18,000 kilometres and had transported over 300 dogs and cats south to find homes.








- No animals are victims of abuse or homelessness




