anniversary, we hope you will join us. There are many different ways to get involved, and even the smallest of actions can help give an animal the second chance they deserve.



Community partnerships make change possible



From life-saving care and last-chance rehoming missions to food pantries for pets and emergency boarding, the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society is there when animals need us most.

Through the Ontario SPCA's community support services, 220,000 lbs of food was delivered to 45 food banks and community partners in 2021. Our goal is to help keep furry bellies full while their families get back on their feet.

Delivering basic animal wellness services to underserved areas of the province was also a continued focus over the past year. The SPCA Mobile Animal Wellness Services unit travelled to Cornwall, Renfrew County, Arnprior and Curve Lake First Nation, administering 173 vaccines, 41 microchips and performing 246 spay and neuter procedures.

Through our 12 animal centres across the province, the Ontario SPCA also found homes for over 3,300 animals, including 200 cats and dogs from shelters in the United States that were at capacity. For many of these animals, we were their last hope.

By working together with partners, we saved over 400 lives through animal transfers over the past year. Among those lives changed were over 130 cats from the Second Chance Pet Network in Dryden.



By coming together and teaming up with Toronto Cat Rescue, we brought over 130 cats south to find loving homes in the GTA.

As we look ahead, another exciting development is on the way – the Ontario SPCA Provincial Dog Rehabilitation
Centre. A unique partnership between the Ontario SPCA and the Peterborough Humane Society, the Rehabilitation
Centre will fill a critical and significant gap in current services. It will address the individualized needs of dogs most difficult to adopt, as well as those recovering from



physical injury. Thanks to the support of donors, the facility is anticipated to be complete by the end of 2022.

Ontario SPCA supporters make this work possible. Thank you to everyone – our staff, volunteers, donors, corporate partners and community leaders – who see the positive impact that animals have on individuals, families and communities.

Remembering Dave Wilson

The Ontario SPCA and Humane Society lost a friend, colleague and animal advocate in 2021 with the passing of Dr. Dave Wilson, Senior Director of Shelter Health & Wellness.

For the past 18 years, Dave was an integral part of the Ontario SPCA. A pioneer in shelter medicine, he set out to create a humane and healthy environment for animals in shelters and beyond. Before it was mainstream to consider the emotional and social needs of animals, Dave and his team put these considerations into practice daily. He also co-authored one of the first manuals of its kind on infectious disease prevention in shelter environments.



Overseeing the health and well-being of thousands of animals in the Ontario SPCA's 12 animal centres, Dave made it his mission to inspire others; it was a passion passed on to the countless animal care staff and veterinary students he mentored.


Dave will always be remembered as a champion for animals. On behalf of those who can't speak for themselves, we thank Dave for changing the lives of animals.




