

Unveiling a community focused road map for the future

Have you ever been on a carefully planned road trip? You pore over the map, excitedly anticipating the adventures ahead. It's the same experience creating a strategic plan for an organization like the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society.

The Ontario SPCA's "road map" includes a 10-year facilities plan to begin identifying major repairs and new capital projects to ensure that our animal centre buildings can meet our communities' needs, now and in the future. A new Central Ontario Regional Animal Centre is also part of the plan to serve Barrie and Central Ontario, as well as our work in the North.

The Ontario SPCA will also continue advocating on behalf of our furry friends. To help make our voice heard, we will be collaborating with Ontario shelters and other like-minded organizations to engage government and communities to influence policy change and increase awareness about animal welfare issues. Improving the animal cruelty investigation system, breed specific legislation and feline declawing are just a few of the animal welfare issues on our radar.

Community outreach and humane education is also our priority in the years ahead. We will be expanding services to support our communities and have started the process of implementing the resources needed to carry out those plans. Community outreach initiatives also include reaching our youngest animal advocates. Through our AnimalSmart™ Humane Education program, we are instilling empathy and compassion and teaching students about the care animals need to thrive. As our future generation, empowering them to advocate for animals will help create a brighter future for our furry friends.

For many years, we have been raising awareness about the challenges facing

Northern communities. We will continue to partner with Northern communities and organizations, with a focus on distributing pet food where it's needed most, scheduling regular spay/neuter programs to support population management, and developing partnerships to support Indigenous communities as they develop their animal care strategies.

Pet overpopulation and a lack of access to wellness services isn't an issue limited to the North. We will continue to bring wellness and spay/neuter services to all underserved areas of the province. As part of that work, the Ontario SPCA is launching a new community support service at its Ontario SPCA Centre Veterinary Hospital in Stouffville. It will help families referred through social services who don't have the means to take their animal to a local veterinarian for routine care.

As part of our ongoing efforts to reach underserved populations, we will continue to deliver spay/neuter and wellness services to these communities across the province. For some people, it may be the first time their animal has ever seen a veterinarian due to factors like financial challenges, accessibility, and the availability of services. Remote Northern communities particularly struggle with a lack of access to basic animal wellness services. By collaborating with other likeminded organizations, we will also leverage existing high volume spay/neuter clinics to reach more animals.

Collaboration is key in everything that we do, and the Ontario SPCA continues to partner with other SPCAs and humane societies to enhance resources in communities across Ontario. The new Ontario SPCA Provincial Dog Rehabilitation Centre in Peterborough is a perfect example of what's possible for animals when we work together.



The Ontario SPCA also looks forward to rolling out a new fund to support shelters in need of financial help. This fund will also provide accessible and affordable animal care, addressing deficiencies in underserved communities and supporting local spay/ neuter initiatives, making this service more readily available to whose who may have lacked these opportunities for their animals.

Changing the lives of animals requires a community approach if we want to maximize our impact. We are ready to offer our support and put ideas into action. We look forward to sharing updates with you as we embark on this next milestone in our organization's history.







Building a better future begins from within

Changing the lives of animals begins at the community level and the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society is positioning itself to expand its services to make the biggest impact possible. We need to invest in our bricks and mortar locations to continue to serve the growing needs of our communities. Many of our buildings are decades-old and they are starting to show their age. We prioritized critical repairs in 2022 to minimize further disrepair, while also making improvements where they were most needed.

One of the most visible changes was to the Ontario SPCA Barrie Animal Centre to make it more functional and comfortable for the animals in our care. Upgrades included a new roof, skylights, flooring, dog runs in the adoption area, which gives dogs awaiting adoption outdoor access, and a meet and greet area for prospective adopters to meet dogs. As we are still many years away from a new Central Ontario Regional Animal Centre, which will serve Barrie and Central Ontario, as well as our work in the North, these renovations were urgently needed to allow us to continue to meet the growing needs of this bustling community.

In Central Ontario, the Ontario SPCA Centre Veterinary Hospital welcomed a new examination and wellness room, which will provide a new community support service for families who are referred through local social services and do not have the means to take their animal to a local veterinarian for routine care.

Many of our other animal centres across the province also received muchneeded upgrades to ensure a safe and healthy space. The Ontario SPCA Lennox & Addington Animal Centre in Napanee required a new roof and eavestrough, as well as a new hot water tank and recirculation pump. The Ontario SPCA Stormont, Dundas & Glengarry Animal Centre in Cornwall had two aging heat pumps replaced and one rebuilt – critical components to keep the building at a comfortable temperature in all seasons.


In Pembroke, the Renfrew County
Animal Centre had a new animal
washing station installed to create a
safer space to wash furry friends who
need a bath. In addition, fencing in the
outdoor dog kennels was repaired and
modified to make it a more functional
space for dogs to enjoy outdoor time,
which is critical for their mental and
physical well-being. More changes are
coming to that centre, which needs
HVAC replacements, including an

air exchanger, which is necessary to prevent the spread of illness among animals. Kennel soundproofing is also underway.


We recognize that community needs are constantly changing and – in this economic climate – there is a growing demand for support. Partnerships are more important than ever before, and we must think creatively and strategically to reach more animals in need. The Humane Society of Durham Region has become part of the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society family. The organizations are planned to be combined in 2024. This step will allow us to strengthen and grow programs and community support services provided by the HSDR to help animals and the families who love them.

There are many other exciting initiatives on the horizon that will position the Ontario SPCA to be able to continue to help animals across Ontario. By investing in our infrastructure, we are poised to roll out new programs and services that communities require to provide the care and support their animals need and deserve.
