Ontario SPCA and Humane Society's new Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic



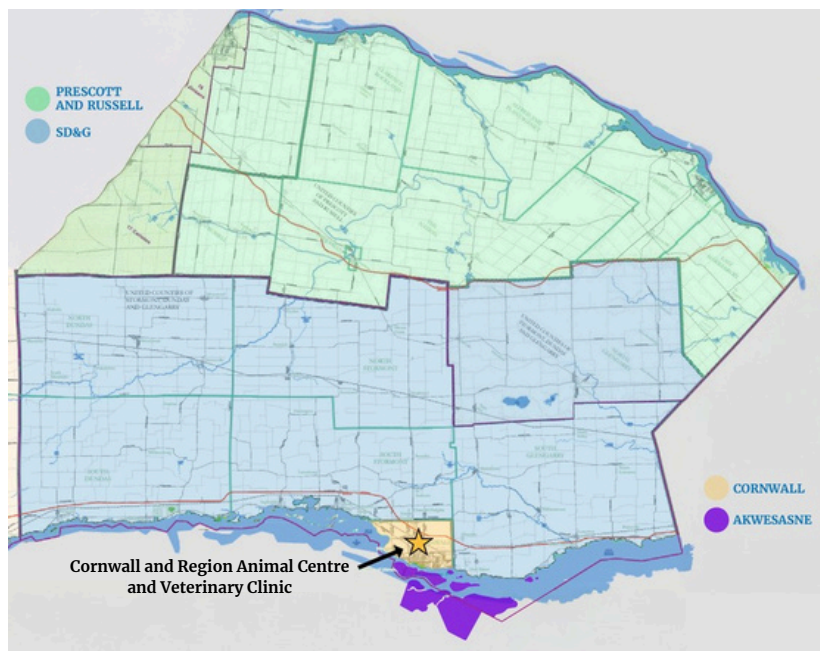
We believe everyone, no matter their age, location or financial means, deserves to have an animal to love.

For over 150 years, the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society has provided care, comfort and compassion to animals in need across the province.

With 13 animal centres across Ontario, including the one in Cornwall, we help animals and their new families find each other. As a vital partner, woven into the fabric of Ontario communities, we make a meaningful impact in so many ways:

-  Utilize strong local partnerships to support proactive animal care.
-  Keep communities safe by sheltering and caring for unhomed animals.
-  Advocate for and educate the public and youth about animal care and welfare.
-  Help contain infectious diseases to keep people and animals healthy and safe.
-  Provide affordable spay/neuter services to prevent thousands of unplanned puppies and kittens.
-  Support families in need by providing pet food, ensuring animals stay with the families who love them.

Serving the communities of Akwesasne, Cornwall, the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry, and the United Counties of Prescott and Russell for over 70 years.





Nous croyons que toute personne, quel que soit son âge, son lieu de résidence ou ses moyens financiers, mérite d'avoir un animal de compagnie.

Depuis plus de 150 ans, la Société protectrice des animaux de l'Ontario (SPCA) offre des soins, du réconfort et de la compassion aux animaux en détresse dans toute la province.

Dans nos 13 centres animaliers en Ontario, y compris celui de Cornwall, nous aidons les animaux et leurs nouvelles familles à se retrouver. En tant que partenaire indispensable, ancré profondément dans les communautés de l'Ontario, nous avons un impact significatif à plusieurs égards.

Les défis actuels

Un grand nombre de défis sans précédent mettent en péril plus d'animaux que jamais en Ontario:

- 1 Le manque de services de stérilisation accessibles et abordables entraîne une augmentation du nombre de portées non planifiées de chatons et de chiots dans de nombreuses communautés.
- 2 Les animaux de compagnie abandonnés et cédés, généralement non stérilisés et souvent malades, remplissent nos centres animaliers à pleine capacité.
- 3 Les admissions à la SPCA de l'Ontario ont augmenté de 20 % au cours de la dernière année, beaucoup d'entre elles présentant des problèmes médicaux et comportementaux complexes nécessitant des soins individualisés.
- 4 Les risques d'épidémies de maladies telle que la rage, le parvovirus, la grippe aviaire et la maladie de Lyme est accru.
- 5 L'augmentation du coût des soins vétérinaires, la pénurie grave de professionnels de la santé animale et les difficultés économiques ne font qu'ajouter à la pression.



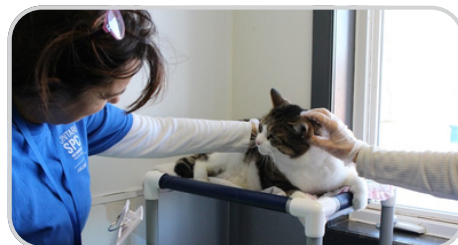
Depuis plus de 70 ans, notre centre animalier de Cornwall sert les communautés d'Akwesasne, de Cornwall, des comtés unis de Stormont, Dundas et Glengarry, ainsi que des comtés unis de Prescott et Russell. Les cinq défis susmentionnés sont rendus plus difficiles à relever en raison des limites fondamentales d'un bâtiment conçu il y a plus de 30 ans:



- La taille et l'état actuels de notre centre animalier ne nous permettent pas de répondre à la demande des soins pour les animaux dans la région, ce qui signifie que la situation va empirer.
- L'animalerie manque d'espaces de quarantaine, d'enclos extérieurs isolés pouvant être nettoyés, d'un système d'insonorisation, d'une salle pour les bénévoles et le personnel, ainsi que d'autres installations indispensables.
- Les besoins en matière de soins et d'hébergement des animaux, accessibles et abordables sont tels que nous dépassons nos capacités actuelles.
- Nos ressources limitées signifient que nos bénévoles et notre personnel dévoué sont souvent mis à rude épreuve, tant physiquement qu'émotionnellement, lorsqu'ils assurent ces soins essentiels à forte intensité.

C'est pourquoi nous devons remplacer notre bâtiment:

- Pour offrir des soins et un bien-être nettement meilleurs à un plus grand nombre d'animaux.
- Pour nous aider à contribuer pleinement aux efforts locaux de collaboration visant à résoudre la crise croissante des soins aux animaux.



La campagne « Building a Brighter Future for Pets and People » (Un meilleur avenir pour les animaux de compagnie et les citoyens) permettra de financer la construction d'un nouveau centre animalier et d'une nouvelle clinique vétérinaire de la SPCA de l'Ontario. Ces infrastructures accueillantes, axées sur la communauté et fondées sur la générosité permettront d'améliorer les services offerts aux animaux et aux citoyens.

Le Centre animalier et clinique vétérinaire de Cornwall et région

Le nouveau Centre animalier et clinique vétérinaire de Cornwall et région sera situé au 2151 rue Second Ouest, à Cornwall, dans un environnement paisible au bord du fleuve Saint-Laurent. Nous prévoyons l'ouverture en 2027. Conçu par DEIMLING Architecture, le nouveau centre aura une superficie de 8 000 pieds carrés et représentera une amélioration à tous les niveaux par rapport à notre centre animalier actuel.

Un centre animalier plus grand et mieux aménagé:



- Nous pourrions accueillir davantage d'animaux errants et abandonnés, ce qui permettra à un plus grand nombre d'entre eux de trouver un foyer permanent et créera une communauté plus sûre.
- Les animaux seront en meilleure santé plus rapidement et seront donc prêts à être adoptés plus tôt.
- Nous pourrions augmenter le nombre d'admissions et d'adoptions d'environ 30%.
- Le temps nécessaire à la coordination et au transport des animaux vers d'autres installations sera réduit.
- Meilleure fluidité des processus d'accueil et de soins.

- 57 places d'hébergement pour les animaux au lieu des 24 actuelles.
- Davantage de soignants supplémentaires seront recrutés pour répondre aux besoins locaux. Quatre nouveaux postes à temps plein et trois nouveaux postes à temps partiel seront créés, ainsi qu'une augmentation de la capacité bénévole à 75 personnes.
- Les bénévoles et le personnel pourront ainsi consacrer davantage de temps à la sensibilisation de la communauté, à l'éducation des jeunes et à l'assistance sociale aux parents d'animaux de compagnie, afin d'améliorer les soins et le bien-être des animaux et de prévenir les maladies et les cas d'abandon.
- Des installations plus modernes et plus professionnelles pour améliorer le bien-être de tous.

Une clinique pour assurer l'accessibilité aux soins de santé des animaux de compagnie



S'inspirant du succès du « Centre Veterinary Hospital » de la SPCA de l'Ontario à Stouffville et de la « Marion Vernon Memorial Animal Clinic » de la SPCA de l'Ontario à Barrie, le nouveau Centre animalier et clinique vétérinaire de Cornwall et région offrira des soins vétérinaires de base, tels que des vaccinations et des services de stérilisation pour les animaux à un coût abordable.

La clinique vétérinaire qui s'étendra sur 1 400 pieds carrés disposera d'une configuration et d'espaces mieux adaptés, ainsi que de l'équipement moderne nécessaire à une équipe de vétérinaires de classe mondiale pour fournir des soins de haute qualité.

La clinique comprendra une salle de traitement médical, une unité de chirurgie, un cabinet de soins dentaires et de radiologie, ainsi que des zones de récupération pour les chats et les chiens.

Il ne sera plus nécessaire d'envoyer les animaux dont nous avons la charge vers d'autres centres pour des soins urgents ou préventifs. Les soins cliniques fournis en interne aideront les animaux du centre animalier, et des tarifs plus abordables pour des interventions proactives telles que la vaccination et la stérilisation des animaux de compagnie changeront la donne pour la région, non seulement en permettant aux citoyens démunis d'économiser sur leurs factures vétérinaires, de diminuer les absences au travail, mais aussi de contribuer à rendre les espaces communautaires plus sûrs et à rendre l'économie plus prospère.

Le nouveau Centre animalier et clinique vétérinaire de Cornwall et région apportera des bienfaits considérables et permanents.

Le coût total du projet nécessite un investissement de 8 millions de dollars. Heureusement, nous sommes déjà bien engagés: 50 % de ce montant — soit 4 millions de dollars — ont déjà été assurés grâce aux ressources de la SPCA de l'Ontario. L'objectif de la campagne « Building a Brighter Future for Pets and People » (Un meilleur avenir pour les animaux de compagnie et les citoyens) est de recueillir les 4 millions de dollars restants.

Today's Challenges

An unprecedented set of challenges is putting more animals in Ontario at risk than ever before:

- 1 Lack of accessible spay/neuter services is leading to an upsurge of unplanned kitten and puppy litters in many communities.
- 2 Abandoned and surrendered pets – usually unsterilized and often ill – are filling our animal centres to capacity.
- 3 Ontario SPCA intakes have jumped by 20% over the past year, many with complex medical and behavioral issues needing individualized care.
- 4 Higher risk of outbreaks of diseases such as rabies, parvovirus, avian influenza, and Lyme disease.
- 5 Increase in the cost of animal care, a dramatic shortage of veterinary professionals, and economic hardships only add to the strain.



At our current animal centre in Cornwall, these five major challenges are made even more difficult by the basic limitations of a building designed over 30 years ago:

- 1 The size and state of our existing animal centre prevents us from responding to the animal care crisis in the region, guaranteeing that conditions will worsen.
- 2 The animal centre is missing quarantine spaces, separated outdoor runs that can be sanitized, sound control, a room for volunteers and staff, and other critical features.
- 3 The need for accessible and affordable animal care and sheltering exceeds our current capacity.
- 4 Limited resources mean our dedicated volunteers and staff are often stretched to the limit, both physically and emotionally, as they provide this essential labour-intensive care.

This is why we must replace our building:

- 1 To provide significantly better care and welfare for many more animals.
- 2 To help us contribute more fully to collaborative local efforts to address the mounting animal care crisis.

Changing The Future Of Animal Care



The **Building a Brighter Future for Pets and People** campaign will make possible a welcoming, community-focused, charity-based, new Ontario SPCA Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic:

Set in a peaceful riverfront location in west Cornwall near green space and a dog park.

The new 8,000-square-foot, Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic – designed by DEIMLING Architecture – will be an improvement in every way over the current animal centre.

To meet the growing needs and reflect the caring, compassionate and proud people of our region.

To catalyze a transformative leap in animal health and welfare serving the communities of Akwesasne, Cornwall, United Counties of Stormont, Dundas & Glengarry and United Counties of Prescott and Russell.

Backed by a strong, well-respected provincial charity and tailored to respond to local needs, the new centre and clinic will enable us to:

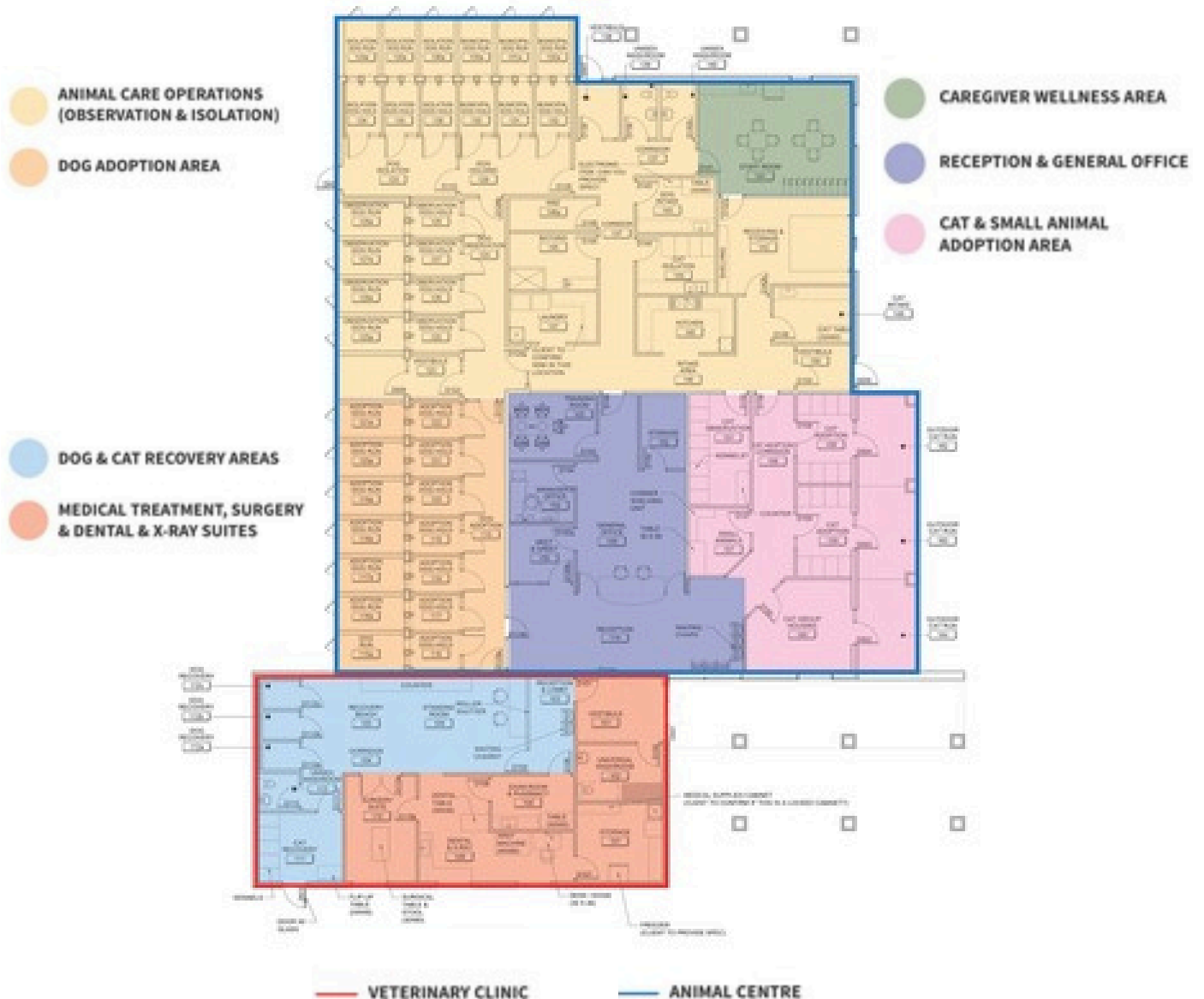
- 1 **Build a strong foundation for proactive animal care**, supporting a safe community and the local partners dedicated to animal welfare.
- 2 **Welcome more animals in need** more efficiently and humanely through larger spaces that reduce stay length through health-promoting, stress-reducing design.
- 3 **Ensure accessible pet healthcare** for the first time in Cornwall through a modern, charity-based, in-house Ontario SPCA veterinary clinic.
- 4 **Attract and develop long-term professional partners** to provide accessible veterinary care in the region and ensure animal health well into the future.

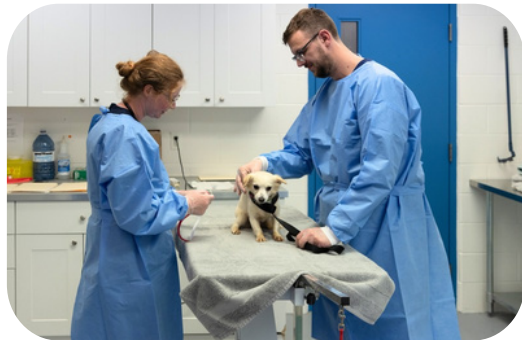


Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic

The new animal centre is fundamental to our capacity to support the community with the tools to curb and ultimately solve the animal care crisis in our region. It will serve as an anchor for a community dedicated to compassionate animal care and welfare.

With a best-practice, sustainable, community-guided design, and incorporating a perfect blend of healthcare and shelter elements, our new animal centre will feature:

- ▶ A design informed by veterinary professionals, with durable materials chosen to maximize the longevity of the building and its contents. These decisions were guided by the Association of Shelter Veterinarians Guidelines for Standards of Care.
- ▶ Separate entrances for cats, dogs and pocket pets to allow a smoother arrival and intake sequence, reducing stress that can lead to ill health and the risk of infectious disease transmission.
- ▶ Dedicated quarantine spaces to help stop the spread of infectious diseases to keep people and other pets safe.



- ▶ Stress-reducing visual and auditory separation of species throughout the facility, from kennels to outdoor runs and adoption spaces.
- ▶ Pocket pets like hamsters and gerbils will enjoy a dedicated area, unlike our current centre where they are housed in the reception area.

- ▶ Separate, disinfectable, and much more usable outdoor spaces for dogs and cats to run and play, boosting physical, emotional and mental health.
- ▶ A calm and accommodating entrance and lobby for visitors and pet families.
- ▶ A meet and greet room to facilitate visits between animals and prospective families.
- ▶ Caregiver spaces for group and solitary activities critical to our animal care mission. It's simple: happier and more fulfilled caregivers provide better care for both animals and their parents.



A Larger And Better Designed Facility



We can take in more stray and abandoned animals off the streets to help more pets find their forever homes and create a safer community.



Animals will get healthy faster so they're ready for adoption sooner.



We'll be able to boost both intakes and adoptions by approximately 30%.



Less time needed to coordinate with and transport animals to other facilities.



Better flow for intake and care processes.



57 animal housing spaces versus 24 in the current animal centre.



More animal caregivers engaged to meet local needs. Including four new full-time and three new part-time positions and increasing volunteer capacity to 75.



Volunteers and staff will have more time for community outreach, delivering youth education and social assistance for pet parents to improve animal care and welfare, preventing illness and abandonment.



A brighter and more professional facility to boost happiness.



The land at 2151 Second Street West, Cornwall was purchased in spring 2024 and the design phase for the new facility is now completed. Our current facility will continue to operate as usual while the new animal centre and veterinary clinic is being built. We anticipate a grand opening in early 2027.

The new animal centre with its larger, brighter, better-designed and calming indoor and outdoor spaces, will make it possible to care for many more animals more efficiently and humanely, improving the health and happiness of animals, staff, volunteers and pet parents alike.

Ensuring Accessible Pet Healthcare

Building on the success of the Ontario SPCA's York Region Veterinary Clinic in Stouffville, and the Ontario SPCA Marion Vernon Memorial Animal Clinic in Barrie, the new Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic will provide basic veterinary care such as vaccinations and spay/neuter services for animals at an affordable cost.



Ontario SPCA Veterinary Clinic - A First In The Region

The 1,400-square-foot veterinary clinic will feature the most appropriate spaces, layout and innovative equipment needed for a world-class professional veterinary team to provide a high standard of care.

Including:

Medical Treatment Suite
For vaccine clinics and the provision of basic veterinary care for community pets.



Surgery Suite
To conduct 1,600 - 3,400 spay/neuter surgeries annually.



Dental And X-ray Suite
Available for animals in our care.



Cat And Dog Recovery Areas
Separated species areas to recover from anesthesia while being closely monitored.



No more sending animals in our care to other facilities for urgent care and preventative wellness. In-house clinical care benefits animal centre animals, but affordable rates for proactive procedures like vaccination and sterilization for community pets will be a game-changer for the community, not only saving residents on veterinary bills and time off from work but also contributing to safer community spaces and a more prosperous economy.

A Game-Changer For Our Community



The impact of the new Cornwall and Region Animal Centre and Veterinary Clinic will be far-reaching and long lasting. Its benefits include:

1 Providing comprehensive disease control.

The new clinic will enable us to vaccinate over a thousand percent more animals by continuing our monthly clinics, but more importantly by vaccinating every animal that undergoes a spay/neuter surgery.



2 Helping to prevent unwanted litters and address overpopulation.

The new clinic will enable us to increase this service for public animals by over two thousand percent, preventing about 50,000 unplanned kittens and puppies from being born per year, significantly reducing overpopulation.

3 Helping to attract professional staff to our region to drastically improve care for the animals in our community while easing overpopulation in the province.

Our new leading-edge clinic will offer veterinarians, registered veterinary technicians and veterinary assistants the opportunity for work in our region.

4 Helping to foster educational partnerships that nurture and expand the next generation of animal care professionals.

Ontario colleges and universities with veterinary programs at all levels require practical experience for their students before they graduate and obtain certification. Our clinic provides an ideal location for these locums.
